

## Top 10 List of Items to Check While EDITING Your Composition

- 1. Are ALL measures numbered?
  - a. Are rehearsal markings located in logical places?
- 2. Do the note beams reflect the meter's beat groupings?
  - a. Have you written rhythms that EXPOSE the middle of the measure (i.e. in 4/4, we should usually see beat 3; use a tie if necessary).
- 3. Do all entrances have dynamics?
- 4. Are there metronome/style markings at the beginning and at all transitions?
- 5. Are articulations adequately used?
- 6. Are slurs used properly?
  - a. Do slurs in winds reflect breathing?
  - b. Do slurs in strings reflect bowings?
  - c. Do slurs in vocal music reflect melismas? (notes sung on the same syllable)
  - d. Do slurs in keyboard/percussion reflect phrasing?
- 7. Repeats and Repeat Signs
  - a. Are repeated bars clearly marked?
  - b. Do all D.S. markings have companion signs?
  - c. Does the "To Coda" have a companion Coda sign?
- 8. Is proper score order observed?
- 9. In tutti passages, are pitches assigned in descending order according to score order within each section? (highest note to trumpet 1, next highest note to trumpet 2, etc.)
- 10. Is what you've written practical/possible for that instrument/voice type?
  - a. Piano writing must take into account hand size.
  - b. Percussion writing must take into account available limbs/mallets.
  - c. Check ranges of instruments/voice type.

Before you submit your composition, remove your name from the score for anonymity.
